

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President's Report

I hope that everyone has had an enjoyable Summer season. The weather will be cooling in the north soon and many of the seasonal Riverlanders will be returning. It will be fun to hear all of the adventures had and family updates.

Through the last several months, Riverland itself has been continuing in the effort for planned improvements. The north dock at the Marina had been completed during the spring and we have now contracted with TCMC to replace the south dock in a similar fashion. The elevation of the wooden dock will be elevated to match that on the north end, with a step onto the finger docks. The first slip will be constructed with a ramp to improve our accessibility with other improvements.

We are also in the process to refurbish the Clubhouse roof. Previous damage from power washing and removal of failed silicone will be replaced with a new Duralast finish. Because the cleaning effort on the roof will damage the paint on the blue mansard surrounding the roof, Riverland will be repainting that surface when completed. The new work should extend this element for another 5 to 10 years.

The pool is scheduled for replacement of the old filtration system with a new cartridge filter in the coming weeks also.

We are nearly completed with the sound system improvements in the Clubhouse, now expanded to replacing the older TV on the rear wall. This TV hasn't worked in some time and we hope that improving this system will help with many Riverland activities.

The planned replacement of Comcast for cable to our homes has been moving forward too. Hotwire has been working offsite in the delivery of fiber for our services. The added cost to our Shareholders will be approximately \$25 per month, but each of us will not have the added cost of internet services as in the past. Most Riverlanders will be saving anywhere from \$35 to \$110 per month with the elimination of those bills. Hotwire will also be providing wireless internet access not only at the Clubhouse, but now also at the Pool, the Gazebo and the Marina. Official system turnover is scheduled for March 1, 2025, however many will likely

be able to activate their system as early as January in a phased activation. In another option, seasonal residents can rent a fire-stick for the Hotwire TV line-up and utilize that in your TV's anywhere in the USA with internet and get access to the same TV channel line-up (minus the FL local channels).


Before closing I would like to make sure we introduce our new Maintenance Employee, Brandon Carroll. He has already made great strides in the improvements to our Laundry area and many smaller projects. We look forward to additional projects we can deliver with Brandon's assistance. Please take the opportunity to introduce yourself when you have an opportunity.

As I am writing this prior to our 2025 Budget review, I will not go into those impacts, but do want to highlight where we currently stand financially. Two banks hold our Reserve Funds, Mid-Florida and Charles Schwab. Collectively we have approximately \$590,000 in reserves and this exceeds our Amended Budget calculation for \$572,721. The accrued interest is adding up.

Finally, in our 2025 Budget we will have several opportunities for infrastructure upgrades benefitting a revised Reserve Study Analysis. If you can think of projects you would like to see moving forward, please make contact with a Riverland Board member. As always, Riverland operates largely on a basis of individual volunteers helping in our delivery of services and in the planning for future needs. Please look for opportunities to assist in this effort; your help will improve all of Riverland.

Fall 2024 Treasurer Report Fall Greetings,

RIVERLAND 2025 BUDGET
The 2025 Riverland Budget has been submitted to the Riverland Board from the Riverland Budget Committee for consideration. A few items of note related to the budget submission, as well as

related recommendations:

- Fully Fund or Not Fully Fund
- There will be a ballot forthcoming for shareholders to vote to fully reserve fund or NOT fully fund the reserves. Not an option to fully fund or partially fund. The fully funded budget is the board default approved budget as requited. To NOT fully fund, there must be a majority shareholder vote to not do so. There will be a ballot forthcoming
- Partially Funded Reserve Budget
- The Budget Committee also provided a partially reserved budget at approximately 40% of reserved funding.
- Partially Funded Mthly Assessment WIFI
- The partially funded assessment is \$335.00 monthly. An effective increase of approximately 7% to 8% over prior year's assessment (prior year was a mix of \$320 and \$300). The \$335 includes cable and Wi-Fi upon changeover to Hot Wire. Thus, a net savings in monthly outlay for most shareholders. As well as additional services for those without Wi-Fi previously. As it is, Comcast was going to go up.

Updated 2025 Reserve Study

The Budget Committee recommended consideration by the board to update the 2023 Reserve Study to 2025. The Budget Committee believes, given the background and experience of shareholders and board members, that with this proposal would thus have significant input from Riverland's talent towards a new reserve. This input, as related to preventative maintenance, internal verses external repairs, and replacement. As an example, when Riverland's internal work took place related to the laundry room, there was approximately \$10k reserved. With the work completed internally at a fraction of that cost, the new laundry reserve requirement would be lowered. This type situations reduces cost and lowers the reserves required going forward.

Interest Reserve Income – Contingency Major Repairs and Replacement

The budget committee recommended a shareholder vote to remove the line-item requirement that reserve investment returns be allocated to specific line-item

reserves. The Reserve study states what is needed for replacement as it is. Thus, adding interest income overstates those line-item amounts. Line-item reserve requirement handcuffs the actions to address repairs and replacement. This proposal would afford flexibilty. A shareholder majority vote is for the authority to move these dollars (approx. 24k annually) into a contingency account earmarked for major replacement and repair. This change would also reduce additional bookkeeping/accounting time and costs.

ACCOUNTING - Internal Controls

Internal Control Policy and Procedures have been updated and this update is memorialized and available for review.

YEAR END 2024 AUDIT

Carr, Riggs and Ingram (CRI), our Auditor's in the past has cut ties with Riverland. Riverland is currently in discussion with other CPA firms regarding a year-end audit of the to be presented 2024 financial data.

One of these firms specializes in Co – Ops and Associations, whereas CRI had only one Co – Op client, which was Riverland. Thus, this cutting of ties by CRI from Riverland is a blessing in disguise as Riverland will have more expertise of which to rely on.

Regarding an Audit, verses a Review, verses a Compilation . Please note the following:
Given the annual Revenue level of Riverland for a Co Op, per 719, an Audit is required and is the default.
Unless there is a shareholder meeting and a majority shareholder vote is ratified at that meeting to NOT conduct an Audit, an Audit is the default. The budget committee recommendation is to move forward with an Audit.

This Audit proposal is based on the facts as follows; Riverland has not had an Audit for at least ten (10) years and perhaps longer, many Accounting processes have been changed and feedback is beneficial to those internal control changes, and potentially other additional internal control measures could be added, and finally, additional transparency.

OTHER

We could write on relative to upgrading the Accounting platform and other matters. But as it is, we already recommend day reading vs night reading. We do encourage questions and feedback, as always.

Continued appreciation to Dalia Bussey, a constant. Dalia oversees the banking operations (AP, ACH, etc..). Also, appreciation for the significant and valued input from the other board members and the budget committee.

Compliance & Grounds Report

I have to start by saying how lucky Riverland was when we were hit with Hurricane Milton. We did have some damage – on 6th street, a Palm tree fell on a home and landed on the edge of the roof. Skirting and gutter

down spouts on a few homes were blown away. Our Riverland sign at the marina garden snapped off with the 75 mph winds. This will be renewed and put back in by Brandon. The damage throughout Martin County is devastating. Riverland was definitely spared.

Riverland Maintenance Department provides Shareholders with services that have and are still ongoing. There are many mechanics to Riverland that you may or may not be aware of that need attention, not just the Palm branches, picking up trash and yard waste, etc. Please be patient if these services are slightly delayed at times. As the Grounds and Pool Director, I must prioritize issues as they arise on a day-to-day basis. The daily pickup of yard waste is one of these services. If at all possible, please place your yard waste in a suitable container for pickup. Large piles are very time consuming as we have a lot of projects going on at this time and we would like this service to be done as quickly as possible. If you are able to bring your yard waste to the dump truck please do so. There are rules about paid Shareholder / Contractors. If anyone has any questions or concerns, please come to a meeting or call the office. Brandon has a Water Treatment license issued by the State of Florida; he could not express enough concern about the conditions behind the garage going into the wetlands area. The excessive debris that was dumped for years ran off into to the wetlands which would have subjected Riverland to a huge fine by the State of Florida. Brandon, with our dedicated volunteers--Tony DeLorenzo, Barry Coombs, Dave Watson, Charlie Gulick, George Acosta and Neil Potts – spent many weeks and are still working very hard to clean and maintain this area, which was not an easy task. Thank you to all the Shareholders who have acknowledged their hard work. I, as well as other Board members, have received phone calls from Shareholders that are amazed at the transformation.

The Laundry room, which was in great need of cleaning and repairs, has been finished for over a month. Every electrical outlet was renewed with new GFI receptacles because they were old and full of paint. There was an

excessive amount of mold on the ceiling when Brandon scraped and removed the black and dirty popcorn paint. The water supply lines that supply water to the washing machines, which have been leaking for a very long time, needed to be replaced. Let's not forget the cost for the leaking city water for all those months. Our many thanks to Brandon for the great job and money saving efforts. Two large Palm trees have been planted on 8th and 9th streets that needed to be removed because they were rotted at be the base. The clubhouse roof is being repaired by contractors who, upon inspection, found a damaged metal area over four feet wide that needs to be replaced on the rear of the clubhouse. The next step is a proper chemical cleaning and a thorough power washing. The last step will be the resealing of the entire roof area. When the roof is finished, Brandon will then be painting the blue Facade around the entire clubhouse. We are in the process of replacing our top load dumpster with an easier side door access sliding door to make it easier for our Shareholders to dispose of trash. No more lifting of the top lid.

It is so important that Shareholders attend Board meetings or watch the Board meetings on Zoom. I can't stress enough the importance of having firsthand information. If you have any concerns, please don't hesitate to call the office or speak to a Board member. This will hopefully clear up all misleading information.

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From the Kitchen

November! The summer has flown by and it's time for the harvest. I hope everyone has had a good summer season despite the hurricanes in Florida. Here in New England we are bringing in the last of the garden produce.

One of my favorite fall vegetables is butternut squash, which is included in this one-pan dinner recipe. All the fall flavors are included.

Fall Skillet Pot Pie

½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter

1 10-oz. container mirepoix (chopped carrots, onions and celery)

1 16-oz. container diced butternut squash

½ cup all-purpose flour, plus more for dusting

2 cups low-sodium chicken broth

3 cups shredded rotisserie chicken

½ cup whole milk

1 cup chopped kale

1 Tbsp. chopped fresh sage

1 large egg

½ (17.3 oz.) package frozen puff pastry sheets, thawed

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In a deep 10-inch ovenproof skillet, melt the butter over medium-high heat. Add mirepoix and butternut squash. Cook until vegetables are softened, stirring often, 6-7 minutes.

In the skillet, sprinkle the vegetables with the flour. Cook, stirring constantly, 1 minute. Stir in broth and let the mixture come to a simmer. Simmer until mixture thickens, stirring constantly, 1-2 minutes. Stir in chicken, milk, kale and sage. Season with salt and pepper. Remove from heat and let cool 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, whisk together the egg and 1 Tbsp. of water. Dust work surface and a rolling pin with flour. Unroll puff pastry onto surface and roll into a 12" square. Lightly score a 1"-wide crosshatch pattern into the dough using a paring knife, taking care not to cut completely through the dough. Carefully roll the dough onto the rolling pin to transfer to the skillet. Unroll the puff pastry over the skillet. Puff pastry can

hang over the edges slightly. Brush evenly with egg wash.

Place skillet on a rimmed baking sheet. Transfer to oven and bake until the top is golden brown and the filling is bubbly, 35-40 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Bon appetit!

a crocodile? This is your opportunity to make the world's greatest imaginary deal ever...






the same as last year: \$9.75 for 3 games plus \$4.25 for banquet/prize fund = a total of \$14.00.


Golfers Wanted
